#### ASK:

- Why do you think Maria pretends to be brave?
- Have you ever done anything that you have been scared to do?
- Why do you think being honest with her mom helped Maria to feel better?

#### **2** GO:

Go online and search for a **map of the United States**. The Grand Canyon is located in Arizona.
Find Arizona on the map. Talk about which states or cities you might travel through to get there from your house.

#### 3 LEARN:

Learn more about the national parks around the country by looking online using the words **national parks for kids**.

#### 4 READ:

- Good Night Grand Canyon by Adam Gamble and Mark Jasper
- Grand Canyon by Jason Chin
- Where is the Grand Canyon? by Jim O'Connor

#### **6** MAKE:

Look online at **pictures of rafting**. Talk with your child about what you might need to take on the raft to be safe. Examples include life jackets, helmets, oars, and drinking water. Make a list with your child and talk about why each item is important.

#### 6 MOVE:

Pretend you are doing the activities discussed in the book. For example, sit in chairs and pretend that it is a boat and you are floating down the river. Pretend to paddle and go around rocks or down waterfalls.

#### PLAY:

Plan an indoor camping trip. Make a tent using blankets and chairs, and fill the space with pillows. Even if you don't sleep in there, you can read books or have a snack and pretend to be camping.

#### WORD TALK:

Homophones are words that sound alike but have different spellings and meanings. Example: *sun* and *son*. Help your child find homophones in the book for these words: *too/two* (page 2, *to*); *bee* (page 4, *be*); *here* (page 7, *hear*).

#### 9 DISCUSS/DO:

Ask your child what it means to be courageous. Talk about a time that you have shown courage. Discuss ways that people can be courageous. Examples include sticking up for what you believe in or overcoming a fear.
